### PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS 2018 - 2019

### STUDENT CIVIC ENGAGEMENT SCHOLARSHIPS

A generous donation from the family of the late George M. Dennison, MTCC's co-founder and the longest serving University of Montana president, prompted the MTCC Board to rename the scholarship the George M. Dennison Civic Engagement Scholarship. Known for his tireless record of service, the scholarship honors his vision which reminds us



that we are better together, that we should strive to find common ground across political divides, and that the core purpose of an education is to serve the public good. In 2019 scholarships were awarded to ten exemplary Montana college students who, like George, have made noticeable positive differences in the communities where they live.

### **NEWMAN CIVIC FELLOWS**

Eight students from MTCC campuses were honored as Newman Civic Fellows. As part of a cohort of 262 students from around the US, this award recognizes and supports students who have

significantly invested in finding solutions to challenges facing Montana communities. The fellowship provides learning opportunities focused on skills fellows need in order to serve as effective agents of change.

## SERVICE LEARNING = STUDENT SUCCESS

Recent UM survey data shows the following increased retention and graduation rates for service learning students versus non-SL students:

**26%** Increased retention rate after two years for students who participated in service learning

**12%** Increased graduation rate for students who participated in a service learning class

**5%** Increased combined retention and graduation rate for service learning students versus the campus as a whole.

### ENGAGED SCHOLARS INITIATIVE

MTCC, in tandem with the national Compact office and other Western Region Compacts, established the Western Region Engaged Scholars Initiative. ESI aims to develop, support, and connect Compact institution faculty and staff who can advance co-



created knowledge, critically engaged pedagogies, models of institutional change, and collaborative action to addresses societal issues. The inaugural class of 13 scholars from Montana, Colorado, and California was selected. To learn more visit Western.Compact.org/ESI.

# **VISTA**



MTCC places full-time VISTA members with colleges, universities, schools and nonprofits throughout Montana to help assess community needs, amplify local initiatives, and support long-term solutions to poverty through education. MTCC also places summer members in ten-week programs to mitigate summer learning loss, serve summer meals to disadvantaged children and support veterans services.

In 2018-19, 15 MTCC VISTAs served with colleges and universities establishing college readiness programs within K-12 schools, creating food pantries to address student food insecurity, and developing partnerships with Montana nonprofits to support college access and success. VISTA members also served in communities across Montana establishing mentorship programs, developing partnerships between K-12 schools and colleges to encourage college-going, and building Native American and Veteran support services in Montana colleges to help with retention and completion. Twenty-four VISTAs served youth in academic summer programming.

### DIRECT SERVICE

The MTCC AmeriCorps program supports K-12 academic success and college access across Montana communities. Dedicated AmeriCorps members serve at K-12 schools, college campuses, and education-centered nonprofits, reaching thousands of Montana students each year. Together, MTCC AmeriCorps members address the Governor's Goals on Education, which calls for an increase in post-secondary degrees from 40% to 60% by 2025.

In 2018-2019, 13 full-time AmeriCorps Leaders and 57 part-time AmeriCorps Team Members served first-generation and low-income students in 20+ communities and 6 campuses across the state. Fifty-two members served while pursuing college degrees, and earned Education Awards to support their continued enrollment. All members served in programs that focus on academic mentoring and success, and normalizing college-going. Through these activities, MTCC AmeriCorps has a lasting impact on K-12 students across Montana by helping them reach for, and succeed in, accessing post-secondary education.


