Montana Campus Compact (MTCC) is a CEOled network of colleges and universities that collectively work to advance the public purposes of higher education to improve community life and educate students for civic and social responsibility. Together, as campuses united behind this joint mission:

"We empower students, faculty, and staff to cocreate reciprocal community partnerships in pursuit of a just, equitable, and sustainable world;

We prepare students to be effective and informed citizens in our democracy with the capacity to deliberate, listen, act, and lead in pursuit of the public good;

We embrace our responsibilities to contribute to the economic, social, environmental, educational, and political health of our communities."

2022-23 HIGHLIGHTS



New Programs, Affiliates and Strategic Plan

Academic Year 2022-23 saw AmeriCorps members with the network coaching over 17,000 young people in postsecondary attainment and over 5,000 college students on college success. We won a new competitive AmeriCorps grant, whose budget (including federal, nonfederal, and Education Awards) totaled \$1,124,223. This followed the closure of a successful grant cycle of our college access AmeriCorps program. The grant award is notable because it bolsters campuses capacity for community service and engagement and aligns with the core mission of cultivating civic participation while supporting student success. These new AmeriCorps resources support student engagement, address community needs, and support our campuses' cultures of service and volunteerism.

With former Blackfeet Community College president and UM's Tribal Outreach Specialist, Dr. Karla Bird, we debuted the eight-part "Centering Indigenous Knowledge" series. The well-attended series focused on the work at Montana's seven tribal colleges to advance indigenous knowledge. They featured a roundtable with Montana's founding administrators and leaders in the tribal college movement.

Our campus network expanded to welcome Chief Dull Knife College (CDKC) this year. This expanded the network's reach and underscored our commitment to advancing higher education and community engagement. Soon after joining, CDKC's Burt Medicine Bull presented the institution's work to promote the Cheyenne language and culture.

We spent time this year listening to stakeholders across the state, coding response data, and drafting an ambitious network strategic plan for 2023-25. It presents a well-defined blueprint for our future undertakings and paves the way for sustained growth in their pursuit of civic engagement and service. This accomplishment exemplifies our unwavering commitment to long-term success and sustainability in fulfilling our mission.

Finally, we said goodbyes to several long-time colleagues whose careers brought them to exciting new places: We thank Dannette Fadness, Robyn Michalec, and Jonathan Carter for their significant contributions to this work and wish them well!

AmeriCorps College Coaches

Supporting College Access and Success

In 2022-2023, fourteen full-time MTCC AmeriCorps College Coaches engaged in service at fifteen sites across Montana, including six projects in partnership with tribal entities. MTCC also had thirty-six part-time AmeriCorps College Coaches involved in service from twelve campuses across the state. These members mentored over 8,500 first-generation and low-income students in college access, success, and career development.

MTCC AmeriCorps College Coaches engaged in activities such as youth-focused out-of-school time activities, food insecurity alleviation, college application nights, FAFSA workshops, STEM career exploration, and college and career planning. In addition, MTCC AmeriCorps College Coaches recruited 268 community volunteers to mentor students and grow the capacity of their campuses and schools.

"Increasing educational equity among children is critical because even tiny words of affirmation can bring insurmountable confidence [to] kids. Seeing children happily learn and grow also helped to quell my personal imposter syndrome as I realized that I was making a demonstrable impact on these children. - 17,825 youth coached in postsecondary attainment
- 5,165 College students were coached in college access and success
- AmeriCorps members leveraged \$58,238 in in-kind resources

AmeriCorps VISTA

Building Capacity to Address Poverty

MTCC's VISTA (Volunteers In Service To America), a legacy national service program, placed service members with campuses and their partnering non-profit organizations, schools, and government agencies to address poverty and build partners' service capacity.

Twenty-two full-time MTCC AmeriCorps VISTA members swore to serve in ten communities, establishing K-12-college partnerships, creating climate action plans, and developing projects to boost student retention and success at Montana colleges and universities.

During the summer of 2023, eighteen VISTA Summer Associates served with MTCC Affiliate Campuses, nonprofits, local state government agencies, and school districts in seven Montana communities.




